intensive community-based supervision, judicial accountability, and

behavioral health treatment to intervene against crime by addressing circumstances underlying criminal conduct; and

WHEREAS, Problem-Solving Courts in Nebraska are specifically designed for

specialized populations of justice-involved individuals and families, including those with substance use and/or mental health disorders,

who are veterans, who are reentering the community after

incarceration, or who are young adults; and

WHEREAS, Problem-Solving Court teams are dedicated to utilizing evidence-

based practices, ensuring extensive training for team members, and collaborating with community partners to provide comprehensive

interventions for participants; and

WHEREAS, Problem-Solving Courts demonstrate cost savings, protect public

safety, and increase the likelihood of successful rehabilitation; and

WHEREAS, Problem-Solving Courts rely on the expertise and support from

judges, defense attorneys, prosecutors, supervision personnel, law enforcement, treatment providers, researchers, educators, and others dedicated to Problem-Solving Courts to improve lives and

strengthen communities across our state.
